Scholarships for Indigenous undergraduate economics students.



Economics Undergraduate **Indigenous Scholarship**

Available to commencing new students.

Value and number awarded: waiver of up to 100% of tuition fees for one student throughout their entire program*.



Schools of Business and Economics Indigenous Student Scholarship

Available to new and continuing students.

Value and number awarded: between A\$3000 and A\$6000 for up to two recipients each year. "The field of economics is one that directly speaks to those who make decisions for the population. If we can provide a voice strong enough to those who will listen, then we can be a voice for change.
